Change of Money.

Honorable Brigadier General George W. Davis, upon the proposal of the Secretary of Justice, has been pleased to issue the following order:

- 1,- In conformity with the provisions in the Order of the President of the Republic, dated 20th of January, 1899, and in Order of the Governor General, dated 8th of March, 1899, all American moneys, whether silver, gold or bills will be circulated in this island at the rate of 166 2/3 to one American dollar.
- 2,- All persons, whether in business or not, will be obliged to accept the American dollar at the rate indicated.
- 3,- Whosever should fail to comply with this disposition will, upon report by police or private individuals to the Municipal Judge, be sent to prison for ten days and fined twenty dollars.
