My dear Sir:

Felipe Casalduc, postmaster at Bajadero, was appointed postmaster at Naguabo, Porto Rico, but has not assumed charge as it appears no competent person has been secured for the postmastership at the former office. An inspector has reported that Mr. Casalduc is somewhat crippled; that he would experience difficulty in performing the work of the Naguabo office and that he is further handicapped by the fact that he neither reads, speaks nor writes English. It appears that the appointment of some other person as postmaster at Naguabo would be for the best interests of the service and I shall therefore be pleased to have you submit the name of some suitable person for that position. The Naguabo office is now of the third class.
